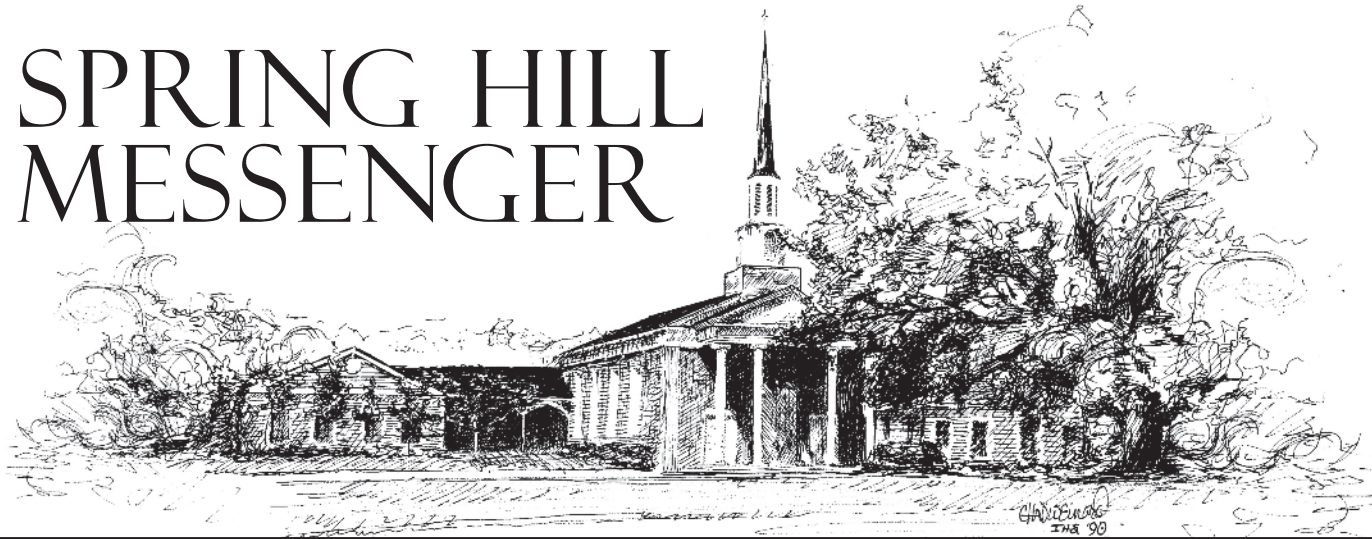

From the Pastor's Desk...

Mark Mueller and I have said to each other that never in our individual ministries have we preached so long on a single theme as we have this year; and yet neither of us is eager to move to another. The reason is simple: to Go Deeper is the point of the Christian life. It's why the Holy Spirit was given to the church in the first place. Jesus promised that when He returned to Heaven, His Father would send a Helper, the Holy Spirit, who would be our teacher and guide, our comforter and counselor, our shepherd and advocate; and that He would lead us in the way that leads to Heaven.

Campus Ministry Musings • • • **some Questions, Some Answers. Still Many More Remain**

Dear Friends:

It has been a wonderfully challenging first month in Campus Ministry. It has been a month of transition, a month of getting my feet wet and learning the ropes, and a month of desperately trying to follow the leading of the Holy Spirit.

Many of you have asked various questions about my move to Campus Ministry, and I would like to take this opportunity to help clear up any confusion about the transition that is currently in full swing.

"Will you still be a part of Spring Hill Presbyterian Church?" YES! As you may or may not know, the Session of SHPC adopted a "single church based Campus Ministry Program" that was proposed by the Presbytery over two years ago. Because of our proximity to the University of South Alabama, the Session agreed we were the obvious choice. During the first 3 years of the program, the financial costs for this ministry will be split between the Presbytery, the church, and the Alabama Presbyterian Campus Board. This financial support, however, will decline after the three years and Spring Hill will incur the majority (we will still receive some minimal funds from APCB) of expenses for running and maintaining the program. The Campus Minister is employed by Spring Hill and the ministry is an outreach of Spring Hill, therefore, I will very much continue to be a part of the church and its staff. An office has been built for the Campus Minister in the Bullard Building. I continue to transition from the CE office to the new office.

"What happened to J. Gaines Betbeze?" I am indebted to J. Gaines for his wonderful friendship and for the foundation he began in Campus Ministry this past year. When the church hired a full time Campus Minister, there was a provision for a part time intern. J. Gaines, being a full time student in upper level classes, determined that he needed to focus on school at this time. We will continue to look for an intern, but until the perfect candidate arises, I am forging ahead with all the help and guidance I can get.

"How's it going?"

My heart gets so full when I begin to answer this question. There is so much going on and yet still so much that I want to do. Currently, we are feeding students lunch at the Space on Mondays. We call this Frunch (free + lunch = frunch). I continue my Women's Bible Study in my home on Tuesday evenings. I am having coffee and hanging out in the Student Center daily. I am currently working on getting a Men's Bible Study off the ground plus a basketball night, a college worship opportunity and Sunday School class, a movie night, and bowling night. We have scheduled a beach retreat for October 16 - 18. The possibilities are endless, and I am having to rely on the Holy Spirit to guide me to develop programs that meet the needs of students.

"What is the Space?"

"The Space" is the name that has been given to the area we rent on South Alabama's campus. It is located in a dorm (Delta2, Room 216). It has a meeting room, kitchenette, and bathroom. If you've never been out there, please feel free to drop by anytime. It is a neat place for students to gather to study or fellowship. Part of our budget pays the rent for this Space.

Many of you have also asked how you can help. The answer to this question is ever changing as this ministry grows and develops. In the coming weeks, I will have more specific ways you can get involved if the Lord leads you in such a way. In the meantime, I want to express my gratitude for such offers! If there's anything I need, it's the help and support of the congregation! Thank you for your willingness to go with me into this mission field.

This is something we also do after a rehearsal sometime during each month with birthday cake, food and more fellowship!

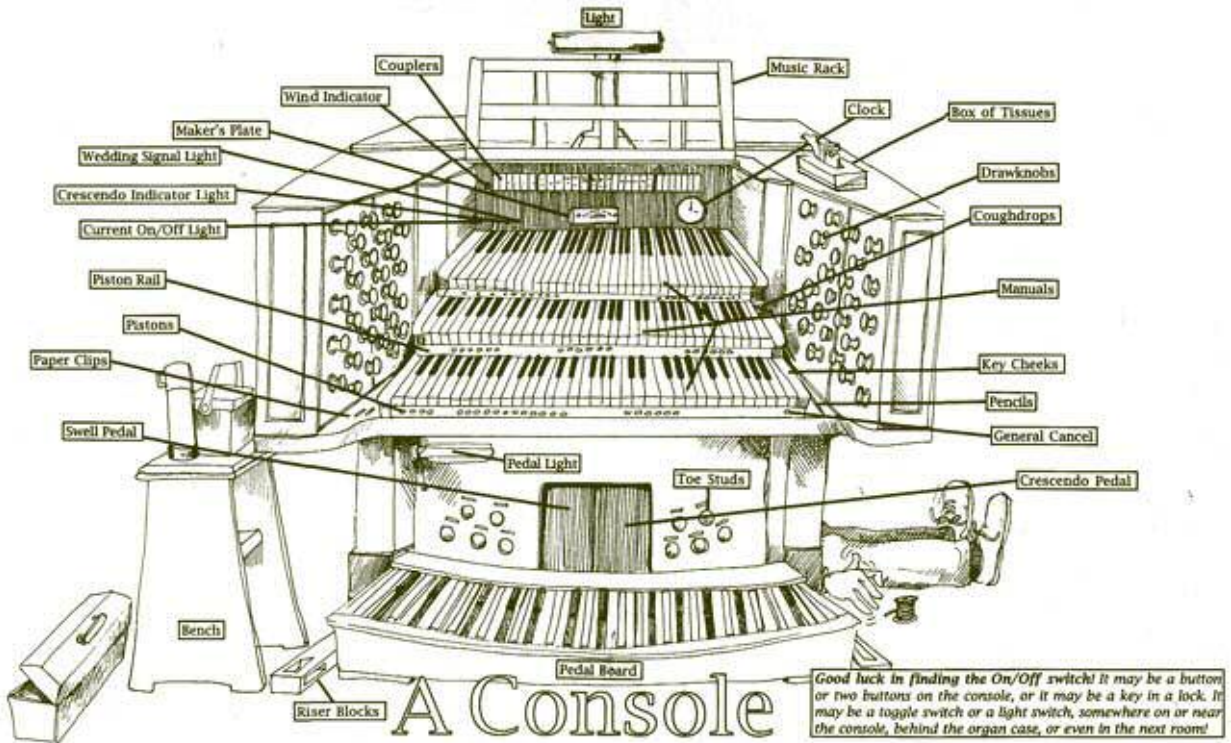

When members of Spring Hill Presbyterian make a blood donation, we join in a very select group. Currently, only 3 out of every 100 people in America donate blood. The need is vital, and our church members can help increase this average by donating regularly through our own blood drives.

Twice each year, in October and in March. The Service Committee of Spring Hill Presbyterian sponsors a blood drive at the church. This fall, on Sunday, October 11, from 9:00 until 1:00, nurses and staff from the American Red Cross will be in the Bullard Building to collect your blood donations, and we urge members to support this important effort. In years past, we averaged over 40 pints of blood each drive, but for the past two years, we have averaged ONLY half that much. Global Missions Committee

Years ago our Session determined that 26%.5% of SHPC's budget should go toward local and global benevolences. Whatever that sum is annually, it is divided between two committees for dissemination – Service Committee for local wants and Global Mission Committee to serve worldwide needs.

One of the concerns of the Global Missions Committee members is WATER. For too many people of the world clean water is a rarity. Unclean water, which is their lot, leads to a cycle of sickness, poverty and lost hope. Unclean water

causes extensive suffering. Water is life but it can also be death. So it is the Committee's decision to help fund new community fresh water wells and to help provide clean drinking water through assisting in funding the distribution of Filta Straws for individual use. Facts:

1. An estimated 4000 children die each day worldwide from water related diseases.
2. Nearly one billion people have no access to clean drinking water.
3. Women and children spend much of their time carrying water from distant places to their homes, fields, and schools in assorted vessels – time better spent in classrooms or the field or tending livestock.
4. In Africa many families have to divide their sparse water between themselves and their livestock with neither choice receiving enough.
5. Diarrhea contracted from dirty water is the biggest killer of children under five years old worldwide. Simple hand washing with soap and clean water could cut that death rate by an estimated one-third.
6. Trachoma, a bacterial disease rampant in Africa and other poverty stricken areas causing excruciating pain and eventual blindness, could be largely eliminated with adequate hand and face washing using clean water.

Global Missions send contributions to the Living Waters University, a mission endeavor which began in our own Synod and has developed into a world-wide ecumenical program. The "university" trains people to install water systems in Ghana, Kenya, Brazil, Central America, Mexico, and Appalachia.

The Committee also contributes to the distribution of Filta Straw, a light weight tube incorporating multiple filters which can be worn around the necks of children & adults. The straw filters 99.5% of the pathogens from infested waters as the individual sucks the water into his/her mouth for a drink. Each straw has an effective life span of 3 years.

Supporting benefits for improving the physical health of needed populations is one of the endeavors of your Global Mission Committee.

Communications Subcommittee at Work

A Communications Subcommittee of Witness Committee has been formed to examine the ways in which our church communicates through the media with its membership and the community. In the first months of its work, it is focusing on our church website. Early thoughts include three main goals, listed here with requests for help from the congregation and staff:

- 1. PHOTOS NEEDED.** To help us, we request that members and staff take photos of church activities and send them to Melissa Root (put hard copies in Newsletter editor's box in the church office or, preferably, send electronic copies to Melissa Root by email.)
- 2. EVENT SCHEDULES NEEDED.** Members of the Subcommittee believe that the website can and should be a resource to which church members can confidently turn to find current information, especially concerning the church's schedule of events. To that end, Wes Baldwin has agreed to serve as our "Calendar Wrangler," making an attempt to wrangle (gather) each event noted in the church bulletins and newsletters and to list them on the website "Calendar of Events." Since Wes can include on the calendar only events that have been noted in those places, or that have been brought to his attention, the Committee urges event coordinators, committee chairs, and staff members to bring events to his attention or to make sure that the church office knows about the event (see below for Wes's email address.)
- 3. KEEPING THE WEBSITE UP-TO-DATE.** Some of the website pages should be stable, giving a thorough and accurate picture of our church to visitors and prospective members. But many parts of the website need to be changing, current and timely, serving as a reference for persons already involved in our church's activities. The Committee hopes that each program area of the church, particularly those who already have a presence on the website, will examine their pages, and make sure that they are updated. Contact a committee member for information or for technical help in updating your group's pages. You can also email the webmaster (Wes Baldwin) from the website (see small print at bottom of each web page).
