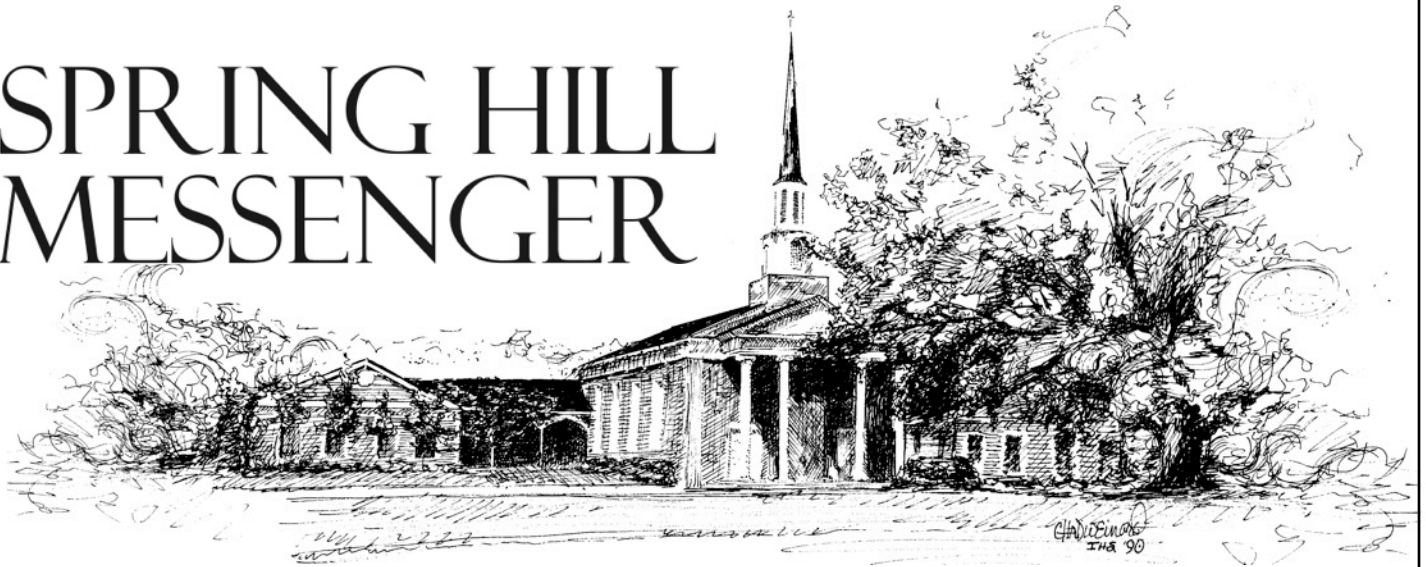

## Neighbors in Need

People on the Gulf Coast are accustomed to rebuilding after hurricanes, but what do you do after a massive oil spill? The Spring Hill Church responded after hurricanes, and is involved in responding to the distress caused by the oil. This is an update, and an invitation to consider becoming involved.

Bayou La Batre was a mess after Katrina, and in the aftermath of that storm, some people came from other places to help with the rebuilding. Some decided to remain, and some of them formed the Hemley Road Church of Christ. Our presbytery and several of its churches worked with that group of people. A relationship developed and it remains. This small but hard-working congregation runs a food pantry (connected with the Bay Area Food Bank), a clothes closet, and reaches out to children in their area.

Food is the most immediate need of people whose livelihood has been disrupted. Between individual gifts and funds taken from the disaster fund, Spring Hill has contributed \$6,700 to the food pantry there. This facility feeds some 300

families per week. They are grateful for what we have contributed, and the need will continue.

In answer to an email to Spring Hill officers asking for suggestions and help, some responded with a question about the need for clothing. The answer was that there is a need for clothing, especially children's clothing. Nora Dawood and her Bible study are collecting clothing, and Naomi Turner is helping.

In addition to physical needs—food and clothing—people whose lives have been disrupted tend to withdraw. Rather than staying connected, they struggle on their own, and forfeit whatever encouragement they could receive from others. To try to help reconnect people, a group of churches are sponsoring a "Family Fun Day," Saturday afternoon, October 16 at Ralston Park in Coden, the next town over from Bayou La Batre. The event will be in the local paper, and children in the

two elementary schools are being invited, as well as the families using the food bank.

There will be food, music (two bands) and crafts and games for children. One of the bands is "Heather and the Monkey King," Steve and Heather Harper and several others. Ann Jung is coordinating the games and activities for children, and a number of Spring Hill people will be involved, including the Faith Frontiers (5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> graders) and their leaders. A grant from Presbyterian Disaster Assistance is bearing the costs for things not donated.

As of this writing, the churches involved are Overlook and Central as well as Spring Hill. Others are being invited.

Dick Coats is helping to coordinate Spring Hill's response to the oil disaster. If there's anything in the above—Family Fun Day, clothing, or giving—or something else that comes to mind, please get in touch with Dick or the people mentioned. This is a disaster, and it will fade from the news and from public awareness but the people of the coast will continue to struggle, and we need to stay connected.

# A Vision of Grace

**1 John 1:9** says, "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness."

If you have ever confessed your sins, then you completely understand the feeling of kneeling before the Father in complete surrender, confessing your sins, and begging for forgiveness. You grasp what it feels like to have your head bowed down to the glory and majesty of the King.

Last Sunday morning, I found myself in such a position and in such a place. I had rolled out of bed and into the Word, and found myself confessing the sins of the previous day.

But, let me pause here and ask you a question: Do you have trouble finding yourself in the Throne Room of God confessing your sins and begging for forgiveness? Do you have to be reminded of 1 John 1:9? Do you have to remember to forgive yourself?

If you answered yes to any of those questions, then you and I are in the same boat. I often find myself in front of Jesus confessing my sins, but rarely find myself realizing that forgiveness is given upon confession. Sometimes, in my mind, I feel the need to make myself feel guilty long after I have confessed my sins and received forgiveness for them.

Honestly, I think Christ knows this about me and has begun to show me what forgiveness looks like. When I sat in the presence of God on that Sunday morning confessing my sins, I envisioned myself as a little girl, sitting in my Father's lap wrapped up in a beautiful white coat. As I confessed my sins over and over again to the Lord, the white jacket He gave me turned a dark color and was covered with stains. In my mind, the jacket I wore changed colors to represent the sins I had committed and was now confessing. As I told the Father

that the beautiful white jacket that He had given me was now stained and colored, He affectionately looked down at me and said, "Ashley, the jacket you are wearing isn't stained or colored. It's white."

I looked down at the jacket that I had thought was discolored and I was amazed to find that the jacket was white, just as the Lord had said. But when I looked up to remind Him that my sins had ruined His gift, He said to me, "Beloved, stop reminding me that the jacket used to be anything other than white. Instead, talk to me about how white the jacket is now. Talk to me about who made it white."

I tell you this vision of God to explain something that I struggle with, and I fear many of you struggle with also. It can be easy to feel the guilt of sin. It can be somewhat challenging to confess sins. But, I have learned that it is very hard for me to recognize grace for what it is. But, as Paul said to the church of Ephesus in Ephesians 1:7-8, "In Him we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of sins, in accordance with the riches of God's grace that He lavished on us with all wisdom and understanding."

When I can permit myself to grasp grace and receive the forgiveness that is abundantly given, then I can begin to have freedom from sin. But, if I choose to dwell in the things I have done in the past, then I will never be able to see that my jacket is truly white, and that my heavenly Father is the only one who made it white as snow.

May you find forgiveness and grace in the presence of God today, and may you never live another moment without confessing and finding freedom through the gracious hand of your Creator.

*“Your Grace is Enough”*

**2 Corinthians 12:9-10**

*But he said to me, “My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness.” Therefore I will boast all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ’s power may rest on me. That is why, for Christ’s sake, I delight in weaknesses, in insults, in hardships, in persecutions, in difficulties. For when I am weak, then I am strong.*

There’s nothing like being taught by a bunch of college students of your own insurmountable weaknesses and desperate need for the grace of God. I can’t even begin to describe the overwhelming but marvelous experiences that have come with the first month of this fall semester. To sum up the heart of this Director of Campus Ministry, I’ll reiterate the prayer I have uttered over and over again, “Lord, I can’t do it without Your help cause I am too weak and the days are too evil. I need all of Your power, all of Your strength, all of the gifts of your Holy Spirit. If this is what you want me to do, then please pour on me everything you’ve got!”

It is through the challenges and brokenness I’ve seen this fall that has enabled me to grasp the truth that Christ spoke to Paul in a deeper way. The grace of God IS enough, and He indeed proves strong when we are weak. This prayer I’ve prayed over and over again led into another prayer,

“Lord, show me what to do. There is so much need in my midst I can’t possibly meet it all. How do I manage it all? How do I reach those who need to be reached? How do I help them reclaim their lives from darkness and brokenness? I’m desperate for Your plan of action.”

As I am typing this newsletter, one answer of many comes. I know in my heart, I am to ask you, the Body of Jesus Christ, for help. So here’s what is needed: mentors. College students need you, the spiritually mature and spiritually stable (only Jesus can tell you if you meet these requirements), to invest in them. As the campus ministry program grows, it is increasingly harder for me to delve deeply into the lives of each student. They need role models who are ahead of them in the journey that can guide, support and hold them accountable to their faith walk. There is a battle being fought for

the time, energy and affections of college students. I promise you every other distraction is investing in them.

If you are interested in being a mentor to a college student: meeting with them once a week, guiding them through personal Bible study and prayer, holding them accountable, and truly being the love of Christ to them, please let me know. I need you. The kingdom needs you.

Do you not say, ‘Four months more and then the **harvest**’? I tell you, open your eyes and **look** at the **fields**! They are ripe for **harvest.**’ - John 4:35

# Remember who you Are.

Greetings in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ!

Who are you? This simple question is one that we are all trying to answer for ourselves, and many of us have been struggling with it for most of our lives. Many of us will answer such a question by saying our names, where we come from, what we do for a living, or who we are to other people. Sometimes we allow other people or things to answer this question for us. Sometimes we stare this question in the face and cannot come up with anything to say.

When all of that happens, our baptism reminds us who we are and whose we are. It tells us that we are the chosen children of God, a royal priesthood, a new creation. When we hear conflicting views from the world, our families, our jobs, and our bank accounts about who we are, our baptism stands firm and strong "You are God's own."

Our culture tells us that our identity is something that we create, do, or achieve. Baptism tells us otherwise. Our faith, our salvation, and our identity as a child of God are all things that we receive. They are free gifts from a gracious and merciful Father.

As I get older, I am further and further removed from the moment of my baptism, but it defines me more and more with every passing year. I have found that we all need to be reminded consistently of the rich meaning of our baptism and the statement that it makes about who we are (and, therefore, how we should live).

For that reason, the Christian Education committee has discerned that Spring Hill will hold baptism classes periodically throughout the year. These classes are for: parents/sponsors/ grandparents of those who are soon-to-be-baptized, parents who want to know more about how they can help their children "remember" their baptism, adults who are feeling called to be baptized, elders and deacons who want to know more about the church's role in baptism, and anyone else who wants to learn more about what it means to be baptized and how we can make our baptism real and meaningful in our lives.

We're strongly encouraging all parents to take this course before your child's baptism. Not only is it our responsibility to acquaint you with the significance of what God is

doing in this act and to remind you of your responsibility for nurturing your child in the Christian life, but we believe that this course will also change your experience of your child's baptism (and quite possibly your own).

The first course will be held on Monday, November 1 and Monday November 8 at 7:00 p.m. Childcare will be provided upon request. (If you are currently expecting, you can certainly take the class before the baby is born! In fact we encourage you do so.) So, the next time someone asks, "Who are you?," remember: "But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, that you may declare the wonderful deeds of Him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light. Once you were no people but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy but now you have received mercy." (1 Peter 2:9-10) AMEN!

## Service Committee

The Service Center of Catholic Social Services is one of over 20 agencies in our community that SHPC assists. It has been present in Mobile since the 1950's. In 1973 it acquired the name that we know it by today. The Service Center is located at 555 Dauphin Street. It is a social service agency that provides emergency assistance to individuals and families in Mobile County during times of crisis. Assistance is available to all persons regardless of race, creed gender or age at no charge.

Since May, case workers from the Service Center have been going to Bayou la Batre and, operating out of St. Margaret's Hall, have provided emergency services to

persons affected by the oil spill who now face job losses and dwindling resources to provide for the basic needs of their families. To date they have provided close to \$28,000 in funding.

They have served an extra 105 households consisting of 319 persons that they would normally not see at the Dauphin St. location. They will continue until they're no longer needed.

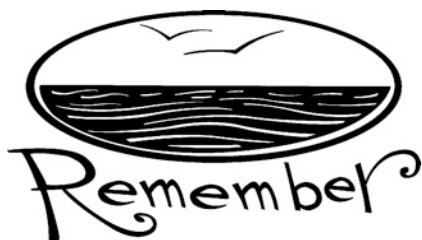
The annual programs: Tools for Schools, Angel Tree, and Santa's Workshop help meet the children's needs for basic school supplies and gifts at Christmas. Through collaborative efforts with others

these material goods are provided to families most in need. SHPC's Christmas Wish List is part of this and is now including some elderly persons who are in need.



The Wine Festival at the picturesque Five Rivers on the Causeway has become an annual fundraising event solely for the Service Center. It will be held on Thursday evening, October 21st. Last year's event, despite the rainy weather, was a great

Christ has called us to follow him and be his disciples: "Come follow me Jesus said and I will make you fishers of men" Mark 1:17. Jesus' call to discipleship is definite and demands us to respond with total commitment. "If anyone would come after me he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow me". Mark 8:34. The American Heritage Dictionary defines a disciple as "one who subscribes to the teachings of a master and assists in spreading them".

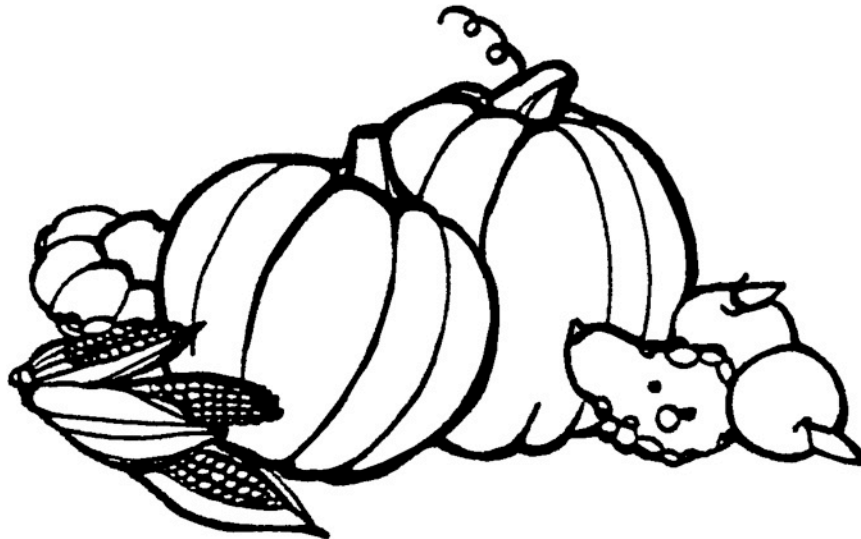
The life of a Christian in its truest sense is not often easy. We are attacked from all sides by the influence and temptations of the world every day. Popular culture, television, music, news media and countless other influences push like the current of a river against us and constantly expose us to a secular world. Despite this influence, (and indeed very often because of it) millions of people want more. They realize there must be more to this life than what they are getting. When faced with the opportunity to act as a disciple, when given a clear (or not

so clear) opportunity to help someone struggling with problems large and small we have an absolute mandate to share the good news of our salvation and spread the gospel. The recipient may not often be receptive, but we are to share none the less. To be afraid or embarrassed to do so is to fall short.

In the same way we are given clear instructions about money. In Matthew 6:19-21 Jesus says "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on Earth, where moth and rust destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. But store up yourselves treasures in Heaven, where moth and rust do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, your heart will be also". In Matthew 6:24 Jesus continues stating "No one can serve two masters. Either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to one and despise the other. You can not serve both God and money".

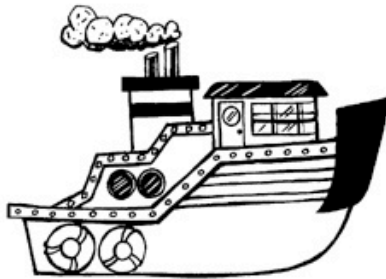
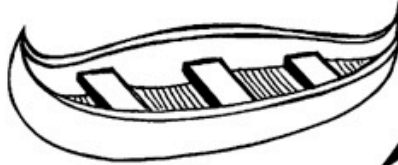
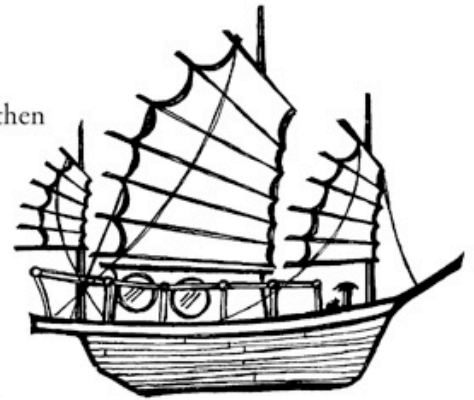
